# **Technical Workshop on Tobacco Plain Packaging** Geneva, 4-6 October 2017

We have the honour to inform you that the WHO Prevention of Noncommunicable Diseases Department (WHO/PND) and the WHO Framework Convention on Tobacco Control Secretariat (WHO FCTC) will jointly host a technical workshop on tobacco plain packaging in Geneva, Switzerland from 4-6 October 2017.
